We asked also for your prayers in our search for a base that could eventually provide us with purpose-built counselling suites, supervision and training spaces and modern offices.

Twelve months on, we are delighted to share the fantastic news that after months of searching and as a result of an incredible gift from the Jean Marie Gunn Trust, we have been able to secure premises which we can now call our new home. Following some refurbishment work to enhance disabled access etc., we hope to move in later this year.

Originally known as 'The Old Shambles', our new premises in Billericay High Street will allow us to be in the heart of the community in a central location in the diocese and will give us the space we need to deliver emotional and mental health therapy to children, young people and their families. It will also provide a springboard from where we can further develop and grow our services.

Chris Tisi, our Chair of Trustees sees this move as a milestone in our history and would like also to share his thoughts with you:

"As a charity we are reliant on the goodwill and incredible support of so many people, without whom we would not, and could not, survive and we are so very grateful to all those who consistently offer encouragement and support. It is a sad truth that the demand on our services continues to grow and the support we have received from the Jean Marie Gunn Trust, and the continuing help of



our volunteers and fundraisers, will enable us to create the solid foundation from where we can develop our services further and continue our work protecting and improving children and young people's mental health and wellbeing."

And so it feels as though we are on the threshold of a new and exciting chapter in the life of the Brentwood Catholic Children's Society and on behalf of our staff and trustees, we would like to thank everyone for their suggestions, good wishes and prayers over this last twelve months. We look forward to sharing updates in our newsletters during the coming year as we settle into our new location, and I would like to add my personal thanks to the trustees of the Jeanne Marie Gunn Trust who by their generous gift, have made this possible for us.

bccs' work at The Bishops' School

How did we manage without **bccs?**

We all know that unhappy children struggle to learn, and I think in schools we are getting better at being curious about the reasons for them finding school life and learning difficult. **bccs** counsellors have been a lifeline for our children – and our staff – for many years now.

We are a medium to large primary school in North Chelmsford, one of a handful of jointly Catholic and Anglican schools in the country, and the only one in Essex. We have well over national numbers of SEN (Special Education Needs) pupils, and a steady stream of pupils who need some extra emotional support from counsellors specially selected and trained for working with them. At the moment, we receive a day and a half's counselling each week; that's room for about 9 children.

Here's what some of our pupils tell us:

'She [the bccs counsellor] makes me feel less stressed out and I like the art we do. At the end I feel happier because I have seen her.'

'Before I go, I feel both happy and a bit scared because I know I can share my difficult things. Afterwards I feel a lot calmer. It's nice to know you've got someone to speak to.'

'It lets my imagination go wild - and I don't have to do work! Making a clay castle made my mum and dad proud of me.'

Here's what our Pastoral Lead told me:

'The **bccs** approach to supporting our children is both heart-warming and professional. They involve every aspect of the child's life – parents, staff, friends, to give the best possible service to children in their care. It's a joy and inspiration to work alongside them.'

bccs don't just provide counselling for children. Their work in supervising our staff, who are coping with pupils whose behaviour can be distressing and de-skilling, is incredibly insightful and supportive – often giving keys to unlocking the way to fruitful relationships and understanding between staff and children. And our staff are vulnerable human beings too, so being able to offer them counselling when the need is there is a massive way in which we as a school can show our support for them too.

Finally, the adaptability of the **bccs** team has meant that we have also been able to provide our staff with basic attachment training, our parents with anxiety training regarding transition to the Foundation Stage, and our local group of Deanery Headteachers with mindfulness training and insights into solving the sometimes seemingly intractable problems in our communities. It's great work!

Thank you, **bccs**, and all who support you, for the great impact you have in our school.
